Strathbungo's Streets Of Crime?

Strathbungo residents were shocked in October to see the area described as, "The most dangerous area outside the city centre".

The Evening Times claimed that "In 2005-06 there were 65 serious violent crimes there - including four attempted murders. There were five sex attacks or indecency crimes, 27 serious assaults and 21 robberies."

However, the article then goes on to explain that the statistics cover the whole of Queens Park, much of Govanhill and even Langside. The article pins the 'blame' for much of the problem on homeless residents in the hostels near Oueens Park.

Councillor Malcolm Cunning states there are more than 300 homeless people currently temporarily housed there, many from outside Glasgow City Council's borders. Most of these hostels are run by the McKever Hotel Group which runs the Parkview and the Queen's Park Hotel on Balvicar Street

Local residents questioned by the paper in Queens Park seemed surprised at the statistics, pointing out how safe the area feels and the need for housing of some description to be provided for these residents

One local resident, Kay Caldwell, said, "I am incensed at the way in which this article portrayed Strathbungo. The real focus of the article is not crime in this area, it is the anti-social behaviour of some residents in the McKever Group's hotels and yet by setting that story in a neighbourhood context you have been able to blight the reputation of the decent folk who live in Strathbungo. It is these very people who have campaigned to draw attention to these two properties and have enlisted the support of local councillors and the local MPs and MSPs."

Space To Think

Why do teenagers in Scotland crave a car when they turn 17? Why are teenagers who drive to school in Scandinavia ridiculed by the majority who use clean, green public transport? Why does it matter? If you own a national bus company, you might want to see how you can get children in Scotland to think like those in Scandinavia, but where do you start?

Space Unlimited, formerly part of Scottish Enterprise but now a not-forprofit organisation, aims to help young people and businesses help one another. It's chosen Strathbungo's Nithsdale Road as its base. The premise is simple. Businesses need innovative new ideas and teenagers need to understand how business works.

If you think it sounds like Young Enterprise on a bigger scale, you'd be wrong. This isn't playing at being in business. The organisation has worked with companies such as Stagecoach, BP, the BBC and GE Plastics. Over the course of a school term, Space Unlimited's coaches help groups of young people come up with new ideas using the resources and aims of a business. They do all the things professionals do: hold meetings, brainstorm, conduct research and create presentations. These are not ad hoc projects dreamt up in a classroom but real problems with a real need for solutions.

Part of the reason for the move to Strathbungo was to make the company more accessible to smaller groups and businesses and to capitalise on the new legislation which compels new building and development projects to put aside money for just these sort of initiatives.

Above all, Space Unlimited wants to address one of the most worrying trends in Scotland's economy. As Demos put it in a recent report, "There is a damaging disconnect between young people and organisations. A disconnect between the training of today and the workplaces of tomorrow." Space Unlimited hopes Strathbungo will be the place where young people and businesses begin to reconnect.

Hogmanay Habits

Bungo At The Bells, over the last few years, has become a habit in Strathbungo - dare we say we've started a new tradition. As, each year, more people join in the celebrations; we thought it was high time we looked at some of the other Hogmanay traditions in Scotland. If we weren't all still recovering from Christmas, we might well do what our forefathers did and use Hogmanay as a good excuse for a spring clean. Juniper berries and water would be picked at sunset and brought in to purify the home. The juniper branches would then be burnt and carried through the home to catch any lurking dirt unawares. Everyone knows about the tradition of first footing. The most welcome firstfooter is a tall, dark, handsome man. Can't think why! They'll be especially keenly welcomed if they bring a gift of salt, coal, whisky or a black bun. But if you're a redheaded woman you might want to think twice about visiting anvone's house after midnight: you'll only bring them bad luck for the year aheadI

What about incorporating new traditions into Bungo At the Bells? Fireball swinging, anyone, as they do in Stonehaven? Or how about tar barrel rolling? There are also traditions that have died out. How would your family feel if they had to wait to open their annual gifts on Handsel Day, the Monday after New Year?

Perhaps one of the most contested issues surrounding Hogmanay is the name itself. No-one knows where it came from and there are dozens of suggestions, taking its origin from Scottish Gaelic, Norman or Old French and even Old English, Flemish, Greek and Spanish!
