## **BUILDING A BETTER STRATHBUNGO**


During the first COVID-19 lockdown, WhatsApp self-help groups sprang up all over the southside.

Out of these, there emerged in the southern half of Strathbungo a group of residents interested in building back better. Their aspirations were to improve the liveability of the area, improve the wildlife potential of our gardens and open spaces, and improve our homes by reducing carbon consumption. They have now formed three sub-groups to reflect these themes which are open to all residents of Strathbungo.

The first group, co-ordinated by Daniel Thomas, is trying to re-imagine Titwood Rd for people. At over 12 metres wide between the kerbs, right now it mostly encourages speeding cars.

There have been lots of ideas, from creating electric vehicle charging and car club spaces to mini-parklets for people congregate. Interestingly, some of the ideas are similar to those floated for Nithsdale Road during the Pollokshields Charrette four years ago.



The second group, co-ordinated by Gareth Johnson, is looking at making our homes greener, a must with government now setting out a timetable for phasing out gas boilers. The general consensus is that for this to work it needs to be from the bottom up. That means us! Tom Nockolds drew our attention to the very interesting demonstration project on Niddrie Road to create an energy-neutral tenement block.



The third group, co-ordinated by Julie MacRae, is looking at what we could do to further improve the wildlife that has proved such a solace during lockdown. Did you know about the Thorncliffe Gardens hedgehogs? Julie challenged us to start thinking about leaving our gardens and the back lanes a bit scruffier and less manicured for the sake of wildlife. This could be a win-win. Slug pellets, for example, kill hedgehogs but, if you enable hedgehogs to access your garden, they will kill the slugs for you.



The challenges of the Climate Emergency and Nature Emergency are so great that it can be difficult to know what to do. The eco-group is developing plans for taking these ideas forward, based on people sharing their experiences and undertaking small practical actions. What better place to start than Strathbungo?

# NETWORK RAIL, THE RAILWAYS AND STRATHBUNGO RAILWAY STATION

Some things change in Strathbungo and some things come around as regular as clockwork: one being the fixation that Network Rail seem to have with our neighbourhood and especially the vegetation on either side of the Barrhead railway line which runs parallel with Moray Place.

Network Rail have had a near two-decade obsession with the trees and growth on the railway line and many of us feared the worst when this year they indicated that yet again shrubs and greenery were in their sights. This time things have been a little different and Network Rail have been more prepared to consult and listen. The result is that so far the culling of trees and growth on both sides of the railway has so far been conducted with more nuance and subtlety, creating two narrow lanes each side of the railway line which have been cleared and tidied.

This has not been the sole focus of Network Rail activity with the future of the former Strathbungo Railway Station, known as Susie's, being in the balance. This building was a railway station from 1877 to 1962 and then for 35 years served the local community as a neighbourhood shop until the summer of last year. Now the existence of the building is in doubt, with Network Rail announcing their intent to demolish it with no consultation, then pausing for consultation, and



plans for demolish now pending at a date to be announced. After extensive discussions with the Strathbungo Society, Network Rail are legally within their rights to demolish this historic building and part of the community, but ethically this is another question and issue.

## **NEW FUTURE FOR LANGSIDE HALLS**

Following Niall Murphy's Bygone Bungo article on the history of Langside Halls, the Strathbungo News is delighted to report that Langside Halls Trust (LHT), a locally based charity with 400+ members, has appointed Glasgow-based Hoskins Architects to produce a costed design and conservation proposal and Business Plan to enable the Trust to seek capital funding to refurbish the Halls.

Langside Halls have lain vacant since April 2017 due to the failure of the Halls' boiler and though now fully replaced the Halls they remain closed due to the on-going COVID-19 pandemic. Strathbungo resident (and former Strathbungo Society Chair), Kevin Kane, the Chair of Langside Halls Trust said: "We want to breathe new life into Langside Halls and give it a financially and environmentally sustainable future.

Working with our partners Glad Café, Southside Festival, Southside Film and others our vision is that Langside Halls stage a regular cultural and social programme, be a platform for existing / new organisations in the Southside and continue as a communityvenue-for-hire."

The Trust secured funding for the Feasibility Study from Glasgow City Council Area Partnerships (Southside Central, Langside and Pollokshields), Glasgow City Heritage Trust and Architectural Heritage Fund Scotland.

Kevin added "The Trustees are all local volunteers and we're very keen to attract new Trustees with professional experience in building, construction, legal and accountancy to help us realise our vision." Halloumi Southside has expanded its existing menu to offer Greek breakfast options until noon including eggs cooked Greek style with either feta or halloumi and watermelon, fresh mint and grilled halloumi. Opening hours have changed to meet COVID-19 restrictions, with sit in so you can now enjoy sit in and take away food on Thu-Sun. There's less tables available to accommodate space, walk-ins are

accepted, but it's it is best to book a table. None of this detracts from this small corner of Greece in Strathbungo, and you'll get a warm welcome a beautifully constructed and decorated room. Food is served in tapas sized portions and customers usually order around two to three plates per person. The food is cooked in good quality olive oil and there are plenty of vegetarian and gluten free options. Mamma Mia, you'll definitely want to go back!

The Remade Network aims to build a repair economy from the bottom up, offering a handy and safe drop off service for the repair and donation of essential items (Mon to Sat from 12-2pm at The Deep End, Nithsdale Street) There is no fee if items cannot be fixed, and sewing, patching, upholstery, and technology services, are all charged affordably at £5 (small repairs), or £10 (regular repairs). Longer repairs require assessment. Through refurbishing IT equipment, they help families in social or digital isolation, improving connectivity to online support services and learning. 
# SCOTLAND AFTER THE VIRUS: BUNGO BOOK AND COMPETITION

'Scotland After the Virus' is the latest book produced by Bungo resident Gerry Hassan in association with Simon Barrow from Edinburgh.

The book contains forty contributions examining the state of Scotland, the impact of COVID-19 and assessing the condition we might be in when we eventually come out of the pandemic. It has within its pages an array of different genres and styles: fiction, poetry and non-fiction, and a range of award-winning authors and emerging voices and talents.

This includes short stories from the likes of Kirstin Innes, Alan Bissett and Julie Bertagna, poetry from Janette Ayachi and Hugh McMillan, and non-fiction from Dani Garavelli, Kapka Kassabova, Katherine Trebeck and Pat Kane. The aim of the book according to Gerry was to offer 'a sense of hope, imagination and even provocation, to aid debate on the kind of values and choices we want as a society as we come out of the pandemic'. Common threads running through the book are how we individually and collectively nurture and support relationships, connectedness and solidarity, and do not allow the effect of COVID-19 to harm those most vulnerable and already disadvantaged.
