

A NEW BRIDGE FOR STRATHBUNGO

The end of summer saw the opening of our new pedestrian bridge between Moray Place and Darnley Rd. This represents the culmination of the efforts of the Society to ensure that a footbridge fit for purpose for the community was preserved in the aftermath of the electrification of the East Kilbride/Central line.

There has been a bridge at this point since the line was opened well over 150 years ago. It was refurbished at considerable cost in 2019, after a renovation period in which the dialogue between the Society and Network Rail was excellent. To be then informed within 2 years of the completion of that project, that it would have to be removed to allow for the new electricity pylons for the new line was a disappointment to say the least.

This news was not well received in the community, and the initial view was that the Society should investigate ways of preserving the original on this site and lobby Network Rail for this option. For various technical reasons, this was simply not possible, and Network Rail then started a wide consultation over three possible designs for a replacement. The option for moving the pedestrian bridge to Marywood Square rather than Regent Park (site of a footbridge till the late 1990's) was rejected out of hand. At this point the Society's objectives became focused on a design that was sympathetic to the conservation area into which the bridge was to be situated on Moray Place and a design that would provide users with a safe experience. One major consideration was that our old footbridge had enabled generations of children to watch the trains. Many of those who corresponded with the Society emphasised that as it was one of the few places in the area where that was possible, we should endeavour to have a bridge designed with that in mind.

Well we emailed, we held talks, we negotiated. Our old bridge has found a new home at the Caledonian Railway's Brechin Station, a railway preservation charity. The community can judge for themselves as to how well the footbridge Mark 2 fits the objectives we set. But within hours of the opening, Strathbungo's children were back, waving to train drivers.

BACK LANE IMPROVEMENTS

The Strathbungo Society applied for and received a £20,000 grant from Glasgow City Council's Private Lane Improvement Fund, and over the summer work was completed on two stretches of lane prone to flooding, with the aim of improving pedestrian access.

Work at the Vennard Gardens entrance was a mixture of recycled setts and gravel in a retaining mesh, with particular attention paid to drainage issues. This was a resounding success; shortly after completion Strathbungo was subject to two unprecedented deluges, sadly flooding homes and businesses, yet this lane remained bone dry.

Further work in Marywood Square, while less dramatic, has also made the worst section passable after heavy rain.

There had been conflicting advice regarding further applications, but we are now in discussion with the council about a further £20,000 grant to continue the work, including the other Vennard Gardens lane entrance, which we had previously dropped from our plans. Grants are from £1,000 to £20,000 per lane, so if residents have ideas about improvements to other back lanes, contact the committee. More details on the Council website

A LONG-TERM PLAN FOR QUEEN'S PARK



Queen's Park is a vital green lung that serves three local council wards with a combined population of 82,000 people - which would make it Scotland's fifth largest town (larger than Paisley, East Kilbride or Cumbernauld) – where 85% of residents living in flats with little or no access to green space. That's why Queens Park is so important – and so well loved.

The recent community consultation asked folks what they liked about the park, how they used it and what would help them use it more. It generated over a thousand responses, something that landscape consultants Ironside Farrar said was unprecedented.

Kevin Kane who chairs the development study said "We will use the community consultation to identify significant and achievable improvements to the park that people want to see. The first stage of the work has identified zonal areas of the park and potential improvements; in the pond and play area closest to Strathbungo, the wildlife area, the formal park landscape up from Victoria Road and the flagpole area, which the consultation has confirmed is the community's favourite place in the park."

"The second stage will identify the key improvement opportunities and identify sources of funding to help create an agreed ten to fifteen years development plan for Queen's Park that will ensure that Queen's Park and Recreation Ground continues to play a vital role in the life and wellbeing of its surrounding communities, including Strathbungo."
